Utah National Parks and More! A Lot More!

Consider the number of places visited, 6 National Parks, a National Recreation area, the Navajo's Monument Valley, a slot canyon and Horseshoe Bend, and even a balloon festival. Consider the miles driven, 3800. Consider the amount of downtime to rest, oops, that would be none.

Because of the epic nature of the trip, it is unreasonable to report on the entire trip in one newsletter. After all, I have 742 photos on my camera not to mention some PDR videos and a few drone photos. So, this edition of the newsletter will cover the first 4 days, September 22nd through 25th.

There were two groups, the main group led by Barb and Ken Payne, and the Salt Lake City group led by Val and Dale Zeisset. Day 1, Sunday September 22nd, St. Louis, MO to Hays, KS

Day 2, Monday September 23rd, Hays, KS to Dillon, CO






























Our hotel is on the shore of the Dillon Reservoir. Very picturesque! So, I take pictures. This is one of the few places that I could fly the drone. Notice the view from my hotel room window. We had dinner at the hotel's café and pub. Look at that cool Ford truck! What a great sunset!

Day 3, Tuesday September 24th, Dillon, CO to Moab, UT













Good morning Dillon! A few morning photos of the reservoir in a different light. The drive through the mountains is very nice. Whoa, what's this? A utility construction company is doing underground work and has the entire highway stopped. I get out of my car to take a picture of the Colorado River with the East Bound lanes of I-70 below us. Kirt is wondering why his cell phone won't

work. Hmm? "No Service" is something we will see a lot on this trip. Don't believe those coverage maps and wild claims made by the carriers.

























Entering Utah, we are greeted by 80 mph speed limit signs. Whoo Hoo! We stop at a scenic overlook on I-70. Awesome, Marcia photo bombs my photo of Carl and

Pat. At least she talked the people into taking a photo of the whole group. The last 3 pictures of the day are a stop at the Red Cliffs Lodge. The water you see is the Colorado River again. We are very close to Moab now. Because we changed our dinner plans, we are going to the Moab Brewery for dinner. What!? They are selling Gelato too!

Day 4, Wednesday September 25th, Moab, UT (2 nights here)


















The sun is coming up over the Sunset Grill high on the hill. We are ready to roll to Arches National Park. By the way, did everyone bring their NP Pass? It sure did save a lot of money. Arches is close, and we only stop briefly at the Visitors center. The next two photos show US 191 coming from the NW to the SE. It runs right through the middle of Moab. These are not mountains but part of the Colorado Plateau with deep canyons. The next 4 photos include a formation that appears to be a lamb. Do you see it?

















How about those car profiles in front of the red rock in the background! The two photos just above the cars can provide some perspective on the scale of the formations. You can see how small the Laguna Blue Stingray looks from across the parking lot. Look right behind it and you will see a large rock at the base of the formation. Mike Kirby is walking toward the rock. Can you find him? Now look at Mike in the next photo. He is standing in front of that rock!













Balanced Rock is in 5 of the next 6 photos. It is a famous rock formation. Eventually, the layer directly beneath the top will erode and it will collapse. It might take a few thousand years though.

















Next is North Window, South Window and Turret Arch. After a photo of some goofy looking guy in shorts, you can see both North Window and South Window at the same time. You must be close to Turret Arch to get that shot. Then there is a photo of a rock formation where new arches are forming across the parking lot.







The next two photos are of Double Arch, one of the most famous rock formations in Arches along with Balanced Rock. The third photo is Delicate Arch. It is a long way from where the photo is taken. We didn't have time to hike all the way to it.











These five photos are from Panorama Point. I guess that is self-explanatory. You sure can see a long way.













Our last stop in Arches is an area called Park Avenue. It seems like you are on a big city street, maybe New York's Park Avenue, looking down the street with the buildings on both sides. In the fourth photo with all the zoom the camera could muster, you can see a road in the small green patch. There is a white van on the road. Again, this demonstrates perspective and scale of these formations.





We go back to Moab for lunch. Barb has Big Don's Pizza and Pasta food truck on her itinerary. Wow! Who knew gourmet pizza could come from a food truck? It is actually a food truck park with nice picnic tables with a net like shade cover and misters!



Originally, the plan was to see sunset in Canyonlands National Park after touring through the park. However, while checking my laptop for some information, Windows 10 pushed a Bing search about Dark Sky. After some quick reading, I learned that Canyonlands NP was a Dark Sky Park. So, we chose as a group to skip a restaurant dinner and stay in the park to see the stars. But what do we do when we need some nourishment? We thought we could take a quickly assembled picnic along. Lunch was late, so we wouldn't need much. Marcia found a hippie store that had sandwiches. We all highly recommend Moon Flower!

We reach Island of the Sky Overlook. This is at the end of the road. This park is surprisingly sparsely populated with visitors. The photos above show the canyons in the late afternoon light. You can see the Green River at the bottom of the canyon. It flows into the Colorado River.









Sunset is approaching! Photographers refer to this lighting as the golden hour. It is easy to see why. The canyon walls are just lighting up with color! It makes humans look pretty good too!











The sunset is outstanding! The photo of Carl is taken after the sunset photo. It is amazing how much light is still reflected from the Canyon walls.



A couple more canyon wall photos. It is hard to resist! The last light from sunset. How does a Dark Sky Park look about 25 minutes after the last light from the sun? Can't see much, can you? I learned that to take a still photo of the stars, you need a tripod and a camera that can take a long exposure shot.

We are so glad we stay in the park to see the stars! There is no moon and the few clouds that made the sunset have dissipated. Humidity is very low. The stars are stunning! Add any superlative you can think of here. Who among you has actually seen the Milky Way? I thought I had seen it a long time ago out in the country. I was wrong.

No sorry ... the PSAS4 and PS4S ZP only comes right now in sizes for the C8 Stingray

You should be able to get PS4S non-ZP. But they were not specifically designed for your C7.

I'd stick with PSS ZP or PSAS3+ ZP to get a tire designed specifically for your C7
