Meeting Minutes



WHAT is PRISMS??

PRISMS is the acronym for Parents and Researchers interested in Smith-Magenis Syndrome (SMS)

Summary:

Smith-Magenis syndrome (SMS) is a complex developmental disorder affecting multiple organ systems of the body. The disorder is characterized by a pattern of abnormalities present at birth (congenital) as well as behavioral and cognitive problems.

Common symptoms include distinctive facial features, skeletal malformations, varying degrees of intellectual disability, speech and motor delays, sleep disturbances, and self-injurious or attention-seeking behaviors. The specific symptoms present in each case can vary dramatically from one individual to another.

Approximately 90% of cases are caused when a portion of a chromosome is missing or deleted (monosomic). This deleted portion within chromosome 17p11.2 includes the RAI1 gene, which is believed to play a major role in the development of the disorder. Other genes within the deleted segment may also play a role in variable features in the syndrome, but it is not fully understood how significant a role they play in the development of SMS. In the remaining cases, there is no deleted material on chromosome 17; these cases are caused by mutations in the RAI1 gene.

What Happened This Month of April in Previous Years

There were 30 members in the club and plans were underway to start maintaining a garden at Building 52 at the JB Veterans Hospital. Plans were also underway for some members to attend the Bash at the National Corvette Museum where they were going to unveil the new C5 Z06. There was also a planned car show in May, which incidentally was when Ron Hagenow first met members of the club and saw Gary Murray. Gary and Ron worked near each other for several years before the Hagenows moved to Alabama.

In April 2014, Ann Brown was our president and on the front page of the newsletter was a picture of the 1 Millionth Corvette looking real nice and then a picture of it flattened due to the sinkhole at the NCM. Member Steve Lyle had recently suffered a heart attack which continues to be a running theme in the club (stay healthy guys!). In addition to our annual VA garden cleanup, we had a mystery run, which is always fun. We hope to have one this year. The winners from the Crazy Bowl held in March were Larry Akins and Ann Brown. Our newsletter editor was Don Giovanoni and he posted a recipe each month. No one submitted a recipe for April so Don printed his most favorite and elaborate recipe, peanut butter

In April 2017, Ray Queen was our president and we had 96 members in the club. Retirees' lunch, VA garden cleanup and the NCM Bash were on our calendar. From Dream to... Almost Reality

Last year many of us began to see the videos of the long awaited mid engine C8 Corvette test mules show up online. They were heavily camouflaged in wrap and were usually running in the dark, or hidden amongst the trees at some out of the way testing track, and shot with a long range lens. I have to say, I was not impressed. Nor was my wife. The bulky back fenders and short, stubby nose were alien to me, not at all Corvette like. I decided that our C7 was the last in a line of beautiful Corvette lineage. However, I kept watching, and reading and I couldn't turn away. I had to know more. I read everything I could find, and the mid engine concept began to intrigue me. People talked about the great handling abilities of a mid engine car due to the change in center of gravity and the ability to lay traction to the road because of the weight over the drive wheels. Still, I could not overlook the body style change.

And then something happened. On July 18th, 2019 in Orange County California the mid engine Corvette was revealed in all its glory in an online presentation. The car was naked, free of its gaudy camouflage wrap, and it was stunning! Without the mind bending, swirling, black and white coverings the body lines were sharp and futuristic. Now comparable to European supercars in styling, the Corvette had finally achieved the stardom that it deserved. How much would it cost? Hold on to your hat, just \$59,995 for a base model.

Still we were not sold. Nice but not for us. And then something else happened. On a trip to Road America in Wisconsin in August we saw two C8 Corvettes live for the first time. I could not take my eyes off of them. I kept going back for another look. Then ELCO brought one in for a reveal at the dealership, and we attended. We saw the car up close, listened to the GM rep talk about the features and options, looked in the engine compartment, and scoped out the interior. This car was growing on us.

Finally one day in October, out for a drive, we pulled into ELCO on a whim to visit

Mark, and I asked him to build one on the computer to see what it looked like and how much it would cost. When it was all said and done, Laurie and I looked at each other and said "why not?" Mark, always eager to help, wrote up the order and submitted it.

It was accepted a few weeks later and we began the wait. GM had been on strike since September 16th and with production stopped, the Bowling Green Assembly plant was not able to finish up the C7 orders. The strike was finally settled on October 25th. Many early C8 buyers were expecting their cars to be built during the first week of December, and the strike destroyed all hope of that. The plant spent the rest of 2019 finishing C7 orders, then went on a two week holiday break, came back, pumped out a few more C7s and then shut down again to get the plant ready to build C8s. Finally, C8 production started the first week of February at a brutally slow pace while they checked to make sure all things were functioning properly.

In the meantime, some of the first few cars were sent out to be reviewed. Car and Driver voted the C8 one of the "Ten Best Cars of 2020" beating out the Porsche 718 Boxter/Cayman, the Porsche Macan, and the Toyota Supra. MotorTrend gave it their "Car of the Year Award" and called it the most premium feeling Corvette that Chevrolet has ever built. MotorWeek named it "Best Performance Car of 2020" and "Best of the Year Overall". Edmunds named it "Best Sports Car of the Year". The C8 was also named "North American Car of the Year".

We finally received our TPW or "target production week" of 3/16/20. The first cars built of any new model year are held for quality control to make sure test fleet cars on the road aren't having problems that need to be addressed before cars are shipped. The plant had begun building cars at a good pace, even adding a second shift. At some point in late February, the shipping lot became full at Bowling Green because cars were held longer than anticipated, and they had to lay off one shift to

slow production. Finally, cars started to ship and all of us future C8 owners were excited to think the second shift would go back to work and production would ramp up, and then the Coronavirus hit! As our 3/16 TPW approached, more and more businesses were shutting down to combat the spread of the virus. Production slowed a bit at the plant, and it was obvious that our TPW would be about a week behind but we were still hopeful. And then the UAW started pressing the big 3 automakers to shut the plants down for two weeks to protect their members from the Coronavirus. At first, on 3/18, the automakers and the UAW agreed that the plants would remain in operation but would make adjustments such as staggering workers starting times and breaks, social distancing, health checks, and frequent shut downs to disinfect the plant. It became obvious that our car would not be built the week of 3/16 but it looked like it could happen the following week of 3/23. Later in the day the announcement came that they had decided to totally shut down all American plants until March 30th.

After talking to some sources, it appeared that for whatever reason Bowling Green Assembly plant would stay open for operation, but with the supply chain compromised for most businesses, they were anticipating a future stoppage due to a shortage of parts or would eventually succumb to the scourge of coronavirus. On 3/18 our build date was possibly one week away. And then the next day on 3/19 the hammer fell. The Bowling Green Assembly Plant decided to shut down as well after the shift on Friday 3/20. They will finish up somewhere around VIN #2800. Our car is VIN #3216. It is reported that they will shut down at least until 3/30 at which time they will reevaluate the circumstances.

So the wait continues. We don't anticipate the plant returning to operation on 3/30, but they will eventually get back to building cars at some point. Just like this country will eventually get back to its routine, and we can all get our lives back. Although we can't wait to see our car, there are more worrisome things to
