In Memoriam

Jerry W. Craig

One of our founding members and club icon, Jerry Craig, died on September 23, 2020. Jerry was instrumental in founding our club and has been associated with Corvettes and racing almost his entire life. Our deepest sympathy goes out to Jeff and Patty, Peggy and Bob, Jerry's brother Paul and wife Kathy as well as his inlaws John and Pam Corrona and Dick and Conita Shoulders.

Where to begin? First, you won't meet a kinder or gentle man. Jerry was a friend to everyone he met. He did so many things in the background and never sought any recognition. Jerry was a retired engineering professor at Washington University and authored and published several engineering texts during his career. Besides racing, he was also active in boating and sailing. Even when his health declined in recent years, he started tinkering with a ham radio again and taught himself Morse code. You never saw Jerry in poor spirits and he was always seeking to improve himself and those around him.

Stories about Jerry would take up too many pages. I am sure each of us has our own favorite memories of him. Here are just a few that I recall...

Rumors were always floated about that when the Corvette plant was in St. Louis, certain "special" parts would make their way out the back door for "testing". Jerry would neither confirm nor deny he received any but there was a twinkle in his eye when he talked about it.

There is also the story about Jerry racing at Elkhart Lake if I remember correctly. Apparently a young guy in a supercharged Mustang wasn't going to let this "old" guy in his Corvette beat him. Yep, he blew up the Mustang trying to keep up with Jerry.

I remember Jerry and Armynta taking their C5 from St. Louis to California. They

drove all up the coast, stopping at wineries along the way. Now you can't put much wine in a trunk of a C5 convertible so they had to ship everything home. I think Jerry mentioned that it was an expensive trip.

And while some of us (namely me) like to baby our cars and keep the mileage down, Jerry drove his. I believe his old 84 had over 300,000 miles. Jerry sold and rebought it back several times.

One of the best times we've had in the club was going to the National Corvette Museum in June 2008 for Jerry and Armynta's museum delivery of their 2008 convertible, 50 years to the day from when they got their first new one in 1958. Both cars were black with a cream top. We took over the museum with our cars on display that day. You may see some of the older club members still wearing t-shirts we had made for the event.

In 2016, Jerry purchased a ticket for a car raffle at the NCM and he won! How many other people do you know with that kind of luck? Again some club members went down to the museum for his delivery. But I believe Jeff was more excited getting checked out in it than Jerry. Jerry's love of C4s never went away.

The last time I was with Jerry was at the NCM during the Labor Day Celebration in 2019. Jerry was doing a track day and I got to ride along with him. We're flying down the straights at about 120 mph and 80 mph in the curves and all Jerry was saying was he wished we could pick up the pace as it was too slow for him!

I am sure that when Jerry got to heaven, Armynta was waiting for him with his glass of orange juice in a Waterford crystal glass, which she did each day. Then I know the two will be enjoying a nice glass of wine. We will all miss you two.

For our newer members, I'm reprinting an article from a previous newsletter that Jerry wrote which outlines his influence in starting the club.

How Did the Club Get Started?

From time to time we have listed how the club got started. Here is a reprint of an article from February 2014 by Jerry Craig, the "godfather" of our club.

It was June, 1953. My friend Bill Curson and I were at the Sports Car Club of America meeting. We were a couple of high school kids who flagged races and helped out for the SCCA. I spotted Mack Yates at the far end of the bar with six or eight people. Mack was the general manager for Barford Chevrolet in Ladue. He commented that they were having the first meeting of the St. Louis Corvette Club. The Corvette had been announced and spy pictures were in the magazines. The group at the meeting had all ordered Corvettes but no one had really seen one. I was partial to Corvettes. Bill went to the dark side – Porsche.

Barford Chevrolet was poised to be the top Corvette dealer in the country. An affluent area and the Corvette plant was in St. Louis. Mack was an avid sports car racer. He built a strong group of owners and was the first STLCC president. Bob Spooner was the second president. Bob raced the "Purple People Eater" Corvette after Jim Jeffords. I was the third president from 1958 to 1962. I raced a 1959 Corvette prepared by VV Cooke. Each year the Route 66 television show would trade in their old Corvettes at Barford as they filmed their way up Route 66. Mack would wholesale the beaten and worn movie star cars as they were in terrible shape.


Meetings and events were very informal. No rules and no dues. SCCA road racing was the main interest. We did go to restaurants and had rallies and economy runs. Channel 5 actually filmed an economy run on Sunday. Fuel injection Corvettes could be set to full lean and get 40-50 mpg! Unheard of mileage in those days but one had to be very careful not to accelerate very fast. (And proof the apple doesn't fall far from the tree, Jeff leaned out the carburetor on his 1978 to win the fuel economy run at Eureka Springs several years ago.)

In 1962, the St. Louis Corvette Club was part of the formation of the National Council of Corvette Clubs.















Meeting Minutes

We had one new couple as guests, Gene and Marian Glandt. They own a 1999 pewter convertible and have had several Corvettes previously, going back to a new 1958. They look forward to joining the club.

President Don Pickles requested a motion to accept the secretary's minutes. Randy Howard made a motion to accept the minutes and they were seconded by Chris Woods. The motion passed.

Treasurer Marcia Sheer presented the treasurer's report. Ken Payne made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Anne Pickles. The motion passed.

Membership Chairman Mike Kunst read the names of the March birthdays and anniversaries. He reported that we had 96 regular members, 6 lifetime members, 15 associate members and 4 sponsors for a grand total of 121. He also congratulated Jim Givens for his recent retirement.

NCM Ambassador Judy Dooley reported that the new exhibit at the NCM is Car-Toon Creatures, featuring drawing and creations from Ed "Big Daddy" Roth which were curated by Tom Peters. Big Daddy was famous for creating the creature called Rat Fink back in the 60s. Also congratulations to Kirt and Marcia Sheer for becoming new members of the Museum. A reminder that the Anniversary Bash is in April so you are urged to register soon.

NCCC Governor Jeff Craig reported that he will be attending the Midwest banquet on March 7. Autocrosses will be starting up in April with the first one in Pekin on April 25-26. He also reminded everyone of the Route 66/St. Louis Corvette Club autocross on June 26-27. However we lost our venue at Family Arena and they are pursuing other sites. There are also several autocrosses upcoming at Rantoul

and Pekin. Jeff urged people to attend the national convention which is July 5-10 in Indianapolis. They are making it more family friendly with many events other than racing. He also mentioned that the Midwest region is the largest in NCCC and sponsors the most events.

Newsletter Editor Kathy Mueller requested that you send newsletter articles directly to her rather than using the club newsletter email. Mike Kunst reported a number of members still do not open their newsletter email. He also reminded everyone they need flyers for events.

Webmaster Steve Kirby reported everything was on target.

Mark Gerecke gave our sponsor's report and noted there are only 4 C7s left. They are planning on getting in 65 C8s this year, with 3 already built. All their allocations have been taken but he anticipates some may be turned back. Mark also noted they have a good selection of used Vettes if anyone is interested. Mark also complimented Jilly's as our new meeting location. He mentioned former member Bob Kusky recently purchased a new Blazer.

By-laws chairman Ron Hagenow reported by-law ballots on proposed changes are available tonight.

The Christmas committee reported they were on target.

The History committee reported they were on target.

The Nominating committee reported they were on target.

The Charity Committee reported that the proposed trivia night has been postponed until the fall.

The Parade Committee Rick Frierdich reported that Veterans Day Parade signups are available tonight.

Marty Dooley reported that the VA hospital cleanup and planting is now April 26 beginning at 1:00 pm. Meet at Building 52 and we will go for food afterwards.

The Christmas Party for the St. Louis Corvette Club will soon be here (December 12, 2020). We know that we are all going through a rough time right now with the Coronavirus, and some of us are still concerned about participating in group

gatherings or going out to a restaurant to eat indoors. With this in mind we have met with Royale Orleans to make sure that they are prepared to provide a safe environment for our members. They have assured us they will have the following protocols in practice at our event:

- 1. All their staff members will have their temperatures taken at the beginning of their shifts and will wear masks for the entire time they are working.
- They now have food stations which means that you will not have any direct contact with food or serving utensils, and only their staff will serve the food items and drinks (cash bar & complimentary) behind a protected Plexiglas shield.
- 3. The tables are social distanced at least 6 feet apart and limited to six members to a table.
- 4. They will be cleaning all door handles and bathrooms with sanitizers on an hourly basis.
- 5. Hand sanitizers can be found throughout the building.
- They have advised us that the CDC and Health Department strongly suggest that our members wear masks when not eating or drinking. Our guidelines require face coverings to be worn at all times indoors except when eating or drinking.
- 7. If you have been in direct contact with someone who has tested positive for Covid-19 in the last 14 days prior to this event, or if you are experiencing any symptoms of the coronavirus on the day of our Christmas Party (fever, loss of taste or smell, cough, body aches, etc.) please DO NOT ENTER ROYALE ORLEANS STAY HOME.... 
Are you prepared to avoid complacency? We want to provide a safe and responsible environment for all Club events. Please respect the safety and well-being of other members as well as yourself.

The St. Louis Corvette Club Historical Society Column

In October 2006, Rick Frierdich was our president and we had 59 members. Our then club sponsor, Route 66 Chevrolet, had been sold to Johnny Londoff. Londoff declined to sponsor our club so we went searching for another sponsor for several years. The club in the previous month sponsored a car show, went to the National Corvette Museum for their anniversary celebration, attended Funfest and the Route 66 Fest. Members were eagerly looking forward to the upcoming trip to Eureka Springs as well as a dinner cruise to Dreamland Palace in Waterloo.

In October 2011, Marty Dooley was our president and we had 92 members. We welcomed Bruce Smull, new son of Kevin and Jamie Smull, who was born in September. We had a lot going on this month. A hayride and bonfire, Eureka Springs, Funfest, ELCO Car show, a dinner run to the Blue Owl, Corvettes and Warbirds fly-in and car show, and finishing off with Fritz's. We were meeting at Sunset Lakes and Banquet Center. Our club newsletter won second place at the anniversary celebration at the NCM. Our editor then was Amy Zlatic.
