### **Meeting Minutes**

The St. Louis Corvette Club met at Jilly's on November 4, 2020, delaying our regular meeting by 1 day due to Election Day.

The meeting was called to order by President Don Pickles at 7:00 pm and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

The Introduction of Officers was as follows: President- Don Pickles, Secretary-Ron Hagenow, Treasurer- Marcia Sheer, Sergeant at Arms- Mike Kirby, and Immediate Past President Ray Queen. Vice President Rick Doerr and Membership Chairman Mike Kunst were not present. Our club sponsors were not in attendance.

President Don Pickles welcomed everyone to the meeting. He reminded members that there would be no 50/50 raffle nor cake due to COVID-19 restrictions. He reminded everyone to social distance as much as possible and wear masks unless you are eating.

President Don Pickles read a thank you note from Rich and Theresa Luebcke thanking the club for our donation in memory of Theresa's father.

We had 2 new members join at us at the meeting. Roger Reinhardt and Theresa Lindemann who met the Grubbs recently in Waterloo. Also, Jim Avery introduced himself. He has been a member for a few months and has participated in some events but this was his first meeting.

President Don Pickles requested a motion to accept the October secretary's minutes. Peggy Craig made a motion to accept the minutes and they were seconded by Mike Price. The motion passed.

Treasurer Marcia Sheer presented the treasurer's report for the month of October. Chris Woods made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Kirt Sheer. The motion passed.

Membership Chairman Mike Kunst was not present so President Don Pickles reported that we had 100 regular members (with the new members joining at the meeting), 7 lifetime members, 12 associate members and 4 sponsors for a grand total of 123.

NCM Ambassador Judy Dooley reported that there is an event at the National Corvette Museum honoring all veterans which is free on Veterans Day. There is little activity going on right now due to the COVID-19 restrictions but the museum is still open.

NCCC Governor Jeff Craig was not present but Peggy Craig reported there was no activity and all racing was cancelled for the year.

Newsletter Editor Kathy Mueller was not present but several members reported that they appreciated the excellent report on our club veterans.

Webmaster Steve Kirby was not present.

Mark Gerecke was not present for our sponsor's report. Randy Howard, reporting for Mark, mentioned that they had 1 C8 that the person ordering it did not take delivery so it was available. The dealership is running a special on \$10,000 off selected cars for November and December.

By-laws chairman Ron Hagenow reported that there will be several changes proposed for next year.

The Christmas committee reported that the party will still be at Royale Orleans on December 12, beginning at 6:00 pm. Don Pickles, Judy Dooley and Chris Woods have met with their management and they are taking every precaution for us to

have a safe party. Money is due by December 1. Cost is \$15 per person with the club picking up the remaining portion of the bill. Cash bar only with no credit cards accepted. There will be a buffet line set up that you will go through; however staff will be plating your meal in keeping with current COVID-19 guidelines. Chris Woods reported that 50 people have signed up so far.

The History committee reported they were on target.

The Nominating committee reported that the current slate of proposed officers are: President, Jim Givens, Vice President Karen Price and Secretary Bev Givens. Since there was no opposition for any office, the nominated people were elected by acclimation. Congratulations to our new board!

Michelle Finn of our Charity Committee introduced Jerry and Judy from the St. Vincent DePaul Society who accepted our donated gifts for Christmas. Judy reported shortly on the family the gifts are going to and thanked the club for our generous support the last several years.

The Parade Committee had no report since the Veterans Day Parade was cancelled. While on the subject of the parade, it was mentioned that we might want to make a donation to the Gold Star Mothers even though we will not be with them in the parade this year. Marty Dooley made a motion that we send \$200 to the Gold Star Mothers and Ken Payne seconded the motion. The motion was approved.

Marty Dooley reported that the VA hospital garden we normally support is not looking good and we continue to not have access to the garden. Sherri Marlo mentioned that since the Veterans Day Parade is cancelled, maybe we could do a drive by at the hospital for our veterans. Marty Dooley will check with the hospital to see if that is possible. More information will be sent out prior to November 11.

In the absence of the vice president, President Don Pickles reviewed the past and upcoming events.

Past events were a Fritz's ice cream run and the Point Labaddie Brewery run sponsored by the Grubbs and Queens. There were about 18 cars participating. There was also the club hayride which had about 36 members attending.

The only upcoming event will be the club Christmas party on December 12, 2020.

President Don Pickles also mentioned that there are several proposed events for next year. Jared Ramsey is investigating a trip to the Detail Garage in Valley Park and Barb Payne spoke about a 9-day trip to Kentucky for next October.

There was no new business but Immediate Past President Ray Queen thanked the outgoing board for their work this past year. Randy Howard asked about a budget meeting. A transition meeting for the new board is scheduled for November 19 and the budget will be brought up at that time.

There were 41 members in attendance.

Attendance prizes were won by Bev Givens and Bob Bradley.

The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, January 5, 2021 beginning at 7:00 pm, unless we are restricted due to COVID-19.

Anne Pickles made a motion that the meeting be adjourned, and it was seconded by Gail Mattler. The motion passed and the meeting adjourned at 7:55 pm.

# Utah National Parks and More! A Lot More!

We are in the final stretch now. There is still some great scenery to see. Anybody for some old western movie locations?

#### Day 12, Thursday, October 3<sup>rd</sup>, Page, AZ to Monument Valley, AZ

Today, we are leaving Page, AZ and driving to Monument Valley, AZ. We will be on the Navajo Reservation the entire day. We are going directly to Goulding's Lodge where we will have lunch. Goulding's is directly across from Monument Valley. After lunch, we browse through the small movie musuem at Goulding's.

#### **Goulding's History**

Harry Goulding was a sheep trader looking for a new business opportunity and a place to call home. In the early 1920s, Harry and his wife Leone, whose nickname was "Mike," visited Monument Valley and were enamored with the area. Although Monument Valley had once been part of the Paiute Indian Reservation, the reservation relocated, and areas of land opened up for sale. The Goulding's jumped at the chance to purchase a substantial plot of land in Monument Valley and quickly set up a Trading Post.

When the Great Depression hit in the 1930s, the Navajo Reservation suffered immensely. Harry heard of a movie production company scouting out locations in the Southwest to use in films. He believed that bringing movie production to Monument Valley would help the local Navajos with much-needed income.

So, Harry and Mike set out on a journey to Hollywood, California with their last \$60. By luck and perseverance, Harry met the famous director John Ford. When Ford saw Harry's photos of Monument Valley, he knew it was the perfect location for his next movie. The Goulding's received an advanced payment, and in a few days, John Ford and his crew began filming *Stagecoach* starring John Wayne.

We are going across the highway to Monument Valley. We are staying at "The View" hotel. This is all Navajo Nation property. I am quite sure this would be a National Monument or Park if it were on federal land.

Here is a photo of the hotel and the view from "The View". Every room has a glass

sliding patio door and balcony. The photo shows two of the most photographed buttes named West Mitten on the left and East Mitten on the right. They have alternative names of Left Mitten and Right Mitten.





We are going on a late afternoon tour of Monument Valley returning just as the sun sets. The Native Americans have names for all the rock formations. We will be seeing more interesting rock formations, a demonstration Hogan, and John Ford Point. The Hogan is the shelter Navajos built to live in back in the 1800s. I have arranged some of the photos so you can see the stark contrast between a late afternoon photo and a sunset photo.












Day 14, Saturday, October 5th, Albuquerque with Barb and Ken





# **Corvette Facts**

No. 269: Was the new Corvette switching from fiberglass to aluminum or even magnesium body construction? That was the buzz in many enthusiast magazines from 1960 to 1962 as rumors about the Sting Ray began to circulate. Although Arkus-Duntov's group did experiment with exotic metals (the 1957 SP-64/Corvette SS received a magnesium body), it was found that fiberglass could be made just as light as aluminum. The 1963 Grand Sport body proved this by cutting the layers

of fiberglass from 5 to 3. Average panel thickness dropped from .100 to .060 inch, and each door weighed a mere 21 pounds apiece. Sure, it was delicate, but so was the Cobra's .045-inch-thick aluminum bodywork. Better still, the Grand Sport's fiberglass panels resisted the ugly body-surface pimples that plagued road-raced Cobras as their soft compound tires grabbed track debris and made like a 12-guage shotgun against the inner fenders at 150 mph. It was telling that in 1965, Shelby specified thicker .050-inch-thick aluminum body stock for the 427 Cobras.

No. 272: In 1965, Corvette offered one of America's first mass-produced applications of four-wheel disc brakes. But is it true that drum brakes were also offered that year? Indeed, they were. Offered as RPO J61, buyers who were either afraid of newfangled technology or drag racers unconcerned with maximum stopping ability could get "last year's" 11-inch drum brakes direct from the St. Louis factory. They even received a \$64.50 credit for going retro. In 1965, 316 cars (of 23,564) sported drum brakes.

No. 277: Everybody knows you could tell the hotter Corvettes apart from the cruisers by checking the tachometer redline marking. If it read 5,500 rpm, the car carried the base engine, 300-hp L75 327 or 390-hp L36 427 (1966 only). If it read to 6,000 rpm, the 350-hp L79 327, 390-hp L36 427 (1967 only) or 400-hp L68 427 tri-carb was on board. Excitement beckoned drivers of Corvettes with 6500-rpm tachometer redline markings. These contained the higher-revving solid-lifter engines, which included the 365-hp L76 327, 375-hp L84 327 fuelie, L78 425-hp 396 big-block (1965 only), 425/450-hp L72 427, 435-hp L71 427 tri-carb, and L88 430-hp 427 (1967 only). A lesser-known gauge tip off was the oil-pressure fascia. On solid -lifter cars it read to 80 psi. Lover-revving hydraulic-lifter cars read only to 60 psi.
